This asynchronous online course will provide students with a broad overview of the history and philosophy of criminal justice, including ethical considerations and definitions of crime. Students will also learn about the origins and modern-day functions of law enforcement, court systems, prosecution and defense, trial processes, and corrections.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES



These goals are achieved through various activities, including listening to the lectures, taking notes, participating in class discussions, reading assigned material, and asking questions.
